150th Anniversary of the Great Civil War Battle at Gettysburg

UPDATE: We are a go with over 40 people signed up to be a part of Company K, 154th New York Volunteer Infantry for the July 4-7 reenactment and the 150th anniversary of the anniversary of the Battle at Gettysburg. This year, 2013, marks the 150th anniversary of the great Civil War battle at Gettysburg, PA. Over 35 Hotchkiss cousins fought there at the time on both sides. Many in the 20th Connecticut and other units such as the 154th NY Volunteer Infantry.

The 154th had seven Hotchkiss men in its ranks and was commanded by Capt Arthur Hotchkiss. Arthur recruited the unknown soldier of Gettysburg, a man named Sgt Humiston who is buried in Gettysburg National Cemetery along with our O. W. Hotchkiss of the 120th NY Volunteer Infantry.

Even if you don't go as a participant, plan on being there for the spectacle. We had 27,000 reenactors there for the 135th Gettysburg; this will eclipse that.

Movie review +

Hello Cousins, Don Hotchkiss, here, your Military Genealogist with a movie review. I recently saw the Spielberg movie "Lincoln" and heartily recommend it for the entire HFA family and friends. Indeed any one calling themselves an American should see this movie. This terrible civil war took between 600 and 700 thousand American lives over the course of 4 bloody years, yet in the final months of the war the issue of slavery had not been decided.

The movie starts with congress about to adjourn after the election of November 1864 where 65 Democrats lost their seats and with the Republican Party (the majority in the House) being so seriously split between Conservatives and Radicals, western and eastern factions, that nothing was getting done. There was almost no hope that the 13th Amendment, passed by the Senate in April of 1864, would be passed by the House and then sent to the states for ratification. The South was defeated and thoughts were now turning to the peace and how that was to be fashioned.

Imagine all those lives lost, the property lost and the thousands of homeless and maimed and for what? Just to go back to the status quo that existed before the war. Slavery intact in those states where it existed in April of 1861. Billions in national treasure sunk for naught. The blood of thousands spilt for naught. 3.8 million people who were told they were emancipated would be remanded back into slavery through the courts. All this a possible outcome as soon as the peace was reestablished.

The question had to be settled once and for all time. The 13th amendment was the only way to do it. The Emancipation Proclamation was just a war measures act that had no legal standing in times of peace, or so it could be argued. It was up to the 38th Congress of the US to decide the question. This is what the movie is about. If you thought "Obama care" was a messy vote with the corn husker kick back and the Louisiana Purchase, wait till you see what Mr. Bilbo and Secretary of State Seward were up to in January of 1865. Talk about dodging a bullet. And as has always been the case in our nation's darkest hours, there was a Hotchkiss in the mix, helping to make history. In this case it was Rep Giles Waldo Hotchkiss, Congressman from the 27th congressional district of New York. He had asked Lincoln for a commission and to command a regiment. Lincoln told him NO, because he was needed more in Congress than on the battlefield.


So many of our cousins fought in this war, 450 for the Union Army, 6 for the Union Navy, 1 Confederate Navy and 35 for the Confederate Army, 45 died and over 100 were maimed. In the final months of the war my GG grandfather was imprisoned in North Carolina, because the war dragged on into the spring of 1865 after the south had offered to surrender in January 1865 if the 13th

Amendment was taken off the table. The South was willing to fight to the death to keep slavery intact and when that proved impossible against the might of the north, they were even willing to surrender to keep the institution intact. Lincoln refused the offer, and the war went on into another bloody spring. Another GG grandfather finally escorted General Grant to Appomattox Court house and watched it come to an end in April of 1865. Yet still had it not been for Congressman Giles Waldo voting for the 13th Amendment, these 4 years and all our family blood that was spilt would have been wasted. Lincoln was right to keep Giles in the House. I have studied all the military cousins in this war and what they contributed in all its theaters. I thought their sacrifice and effort was the most significant part of the history of this war, but I think I was a bit off on that position. In the end it was this one vote in Congress of the US that made the difference and gave some meaning to the terrible sacrifice on both sides. The measure passed by just 2 votes proving once again that the pen is mightier than the sword and that in the end we are a Nation of Laws.

Please take two and a half hours out of your life and go see this movie with your kids and friends. See what we did to make History. See how painfully close it all came to falling apart and how one man thru his sheer force of will pulled it off against impossible odds and then left us before ratification. Almost as if his death would secure the very thing he worked so hard to achieve. It is a great movie and a very accurate one as well. A company of the 150th Pennsylvania Volunteer Infantry was detailed by Governor Curtain to be Lincoln's body guards, the Bogus Bucktails. They are shown with the proper bucktail tail on their hats (and yes there was a Hotchkiss in this unit, need you ask?). The young Lincoln riding in his wagon pulled by a goat thru the White House is shown (he was an undisciplined pain for old Secretary of War Stanton.) Our cousin Pizort Zeroy Hotchkiss was on the telegraph key the day of the vote keeping his commander informed of its slow progress as shown in the movie. The historical details go on and on. Spielberg got it right.

We did our part in 1776, in 1865 and our Hotchkiss cousins are still in harm's way all over the globe. I guess it is just what we do. Thank you's to the research of my partner in historical crime Ms. Ruth Rauma.

Editor's note: Coming from Don, who has reenacted battles from this war for years, praise for the movie is a big plus. I would also second his recommendation to see the movie.
