Friday evening will feature a 'Welcome' get together. During the weekend we'll see the reenactors camp with 'show and tell', and a meal or two at historic taverns. As mentioned in the September News, a few additional ideas for making the weekend into a memorable vacation could include: Independence Hall and the Liberty Bell in nearby Philadelphia, about 2 1/2 hours away. The new Museum of the American Revolution there is getting rave reviews. Here are a couple of examples of what you can see there.

Climb aboard a 45-foot replica ship and experience the war at sea through the story of James Forten a 14 year-old free African American, who later became a prominent abolitionist and Philadelphia businessman.

See one of the most iconic surviving artifacts of the Revolution – General George Washington's War Tent, called the "rock star of the collection" by the New York Times.

Design your own soldier uniform with an interactive display, and learn about how soldiers displayed their loyalties and ideas of liberty by engraving mottos on their equipment, or by choosing a particular fashion of fighting clothes.

Joan Woolson, age 87 of Boone, IA died at her home on Monday, February 25, 2019.

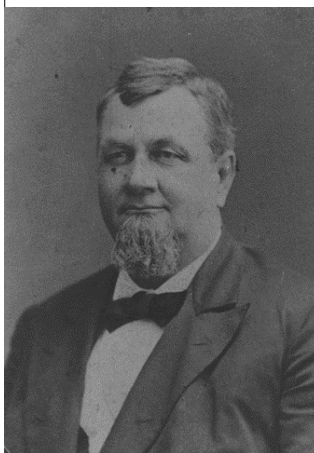

Healing Benjamin's Legacy

Benjamin Berkeley Hotchkiss (1826 – 1885)



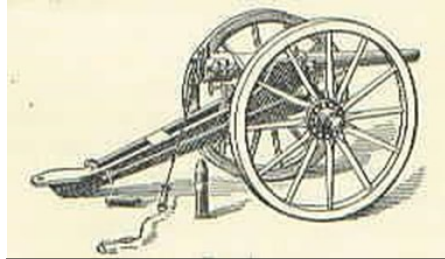
Visiting Paris on New Year's 1980, I found the Hotchkiss Arms Company in the phone book, at No.52 Champs-Élysées. Had it been a work day, I might have stopped in to introduce myself as a descendant of the founder.

Thirty years later in Maine, I discovered that his first successful product had

been used in an infamous massacre, and that I wasn't really his direct descendant.

Benjamin Berkeley Hotchkiss invented an early breech-loaded rifled light cannon. He emigrated to France, because the US Army was not buying large quantities of arms right after the Civil War. France was beginning hostilities with Prussia, and needed his advanced weapons. His company, Hotchkiss et Cie, manufactured several models of cannons and machine guns.

The US Army did, however, have a requirement, during the Plains Indian Wars, for a highly mobile light cannon that could fire accurately at long range as well as rapidly mow down charging fighters at close range. The Army purchased a total of 56 of these new guns from Hotchkiss et Cie.

In 1877, a single Hotchkiss Mountain Gun broke the stalemate between the Army and the Nez Perce, at the Battle of Bear's Paw Mountain in Montana, preventing Chief Joseph's band from escaping to Canada to join up with Sitting Bull.

Four of these guns were later used at the 1890 Wounded Knee Massacre, where soldiers of the 7th Cavalry killed hundreds of Lakota men, women and children on a cold winter day of horrific bloodshed. General Nelson Miles was furious at this outcome, and brought court-martial against the officers in charge. But because the massacre was politically popular, he was overridden by President Harrison, and instead Congressional

Medals of Honor were awarded to twenty of the soldiers.

The soldiers were thrilled with their guns' performance, but the Lakota survivors called them "Hotchkill".

When I was young, my father always talked about "great uncle Benjamin" and his inventions. On discovering the Wounded Knee connection, I began to dig deep-

er. I'm eternally grateful to Lin Meeker and the late Joan Johnson for their help in my research. It turned out that I was descended from a completely different branch of the family tree – Samuel's son John, while Benjamin was descended from Joshua.

As I understand it, Benjamin left his first wife, Maria Bissell Hotchkiss, behind in Connecticut when he moved to France, and married again there without divorcing Maria. She thus inherited his fortune and used some of it to found the Hotchkiss School in Lakeville. I have not as yet connected with any of his descendants.

Clarifying my relationship with him was very helpful, but did not end

my exploration of the history. It had sparked a keen interest in promoting healing from intergenerational trauma. I wrote about it for the organization I volunteer for here in Maine ([part 1](#) and [part 2](#)), and eventually connected with a descendant of the officer who gave the order to fire at Wounded Knee, as well as some of the Lakota descendants of the massacre's victims.

The Wounded Knee Massacre is the subject of legislation before Congress, called the Remove the Stain Act, to rescind the medals awarded to the soldiers. I have signed a joint statement in support of this legislation.

Believing that great opportunities for healing can arise from greater awareness, I continue to connect and research. The Army acquired 56 Hotchkiss Mountain Guns, but so far I've only accounted for 5 of them used against Native people, as told above. Some of them were used in the Spanish-American War, and some were sold to other countries later on. I do suspect that they were used against Native people in more than these two events.

History affects each of us differently. We bring unique perspectives and knowledge. Informed by experience with great projects of healing and truth, I have approached this topic in my own way. I welcome your questions, knowledge and perspectives.
